2024 ROAD TO THE PRESIDENTS CUP EPISODE 1

A1 – OPENING STANDUP – SERIES INTRO

WE ARE OFFICIALLY ON THE ROAD TO THE PRESIDENTS CUP! HELLO AND BONJOUR FROM THE ROYAL MONTREAL GOLF CLUB – I'M PAIGE MACKENZIE. BEGINNING TODAY, AND IN THE COMING WEEKS LEADING UP TO THE 2024 EDITION, WE'RE BRINGING YOU A FOUR-PART SERIES TO PREPARE YOU FOR THE 15TH PLAYING OF THE PRESIDENTS CUP.

WHILE THE UNITED STATES LOOKS TO WIN FOR THE 10TH-CONSECUTIVE TIME, THE INTERNATIONALS BELIEVE THAT WHAT THEY'RE BUILDING WILL SOON COME TO FRUITION. WE'LL TAKE A CLOSER LOOK AT THE STALWARTS, THE PLAYERS WHO ARE HUNGRY TO GET BACK ON THEIR RESPECTIVE TEAMS, AND THOSE STARVING TO PLAY FOR THE FIRST TIME ... AND, OF COURSE, THE CAPTAINS WHO WILL LEAD BOTH SIDES, WHO'S JOURNEY BEGAN IN MONTREAL LAST SEPTEMBER TO CELEBRATE THE ONE-YEAR COUNTDOWN TO THE PRESIDENTS CUP.

<u>A2 – COLD OPEN</u>

MIKE WEIR: Every time I get to come to Montreal I love it. I love the culture of the people. We have great diversity in this city, in our country in general, but here in particular the people are fantastic.

JIM FURYK: The folks here from Canada are great sports fans. They love their golf and this is a great venue for them.

MIKE WEIR: I'm in this position now to lead a bunch of guys that I really care about and want them to succeed and want them to reach their, their goals and their expectations. It's an honor to do that. I'm really looking forward to the challenge.

JIM FURYK: It was an honor to be named captain. Any time I can have the flag on my sleeve and represent our country to represent the American side of the PGA TOUR and 12 guys is amazing.

ANNC: And it's Chris DiMarco who wins the Presidents Cup!

JIM FURYK: It's an honor for us to be a part of it and I'm excited to lead this team.

MIKE WEIR: We've known each other a long time and to be captaining against Jim is an honor.

MIKE WEIR: Captain, welcome to Montreal.

JIM FURYK: Thank you, appreciate it. Thanks a lot.

JIM FURYK: I think they've become very competitive in this event.

ANNC: This means everything in the world to him. Got it! Tom Kim delivers.

JIM FURYK: They've kind of bought into the mentality and have played with a chip on their shoulder. We have to go out there with the mentality that we're not being chased.

ANNC: That's a drop the putt moment for Justin Thomas and Tiger Woods!

MIKE WEIR: He's going to have his guys ready to play and I'm going to have my guys ready to play. So, it's going to be a great battle.

ANNC: He wanted a big stage, he got it, and he delivered!

THIS IS THE ROAD TO THE PRESIDENTS CUP – BROUGHT TO YOU BY GLOBAL PARTNERS ROLEX ... ONE PASSWORD... AND COGNIZANT.

A3 – JIM FURYK PRESIDENTS CUP CAREER

JIM FURYK: You start each-and-every year kind of making some goals and for almost every player, making a Presidents Cup team, that's usually kind of one of the first things on the list, if not the first thing on your list that I want to be considered one of the 12 best Americans in the game.

NATS: From Ponte Vedra Beach, Florida, Jim Furyk!

BEGINNING IN 1998, JIM FURYK PLAYED IN SEVEN PRESIDENTS CUPS, AND EARNED 21.5 POINTS WHILE HELPING THE UNITED STATES TO WIN FIVE TIMES ...

JIM FURYK: We had a lot of fun together, a lot of camaraderie, and we won a bunch of Presidents Cups. And so that would be what I'm, I'm most proud of.

MIKE WEIR: He was a stalwart of those teams for all those years and performed well.

ANNC: This is for eagle and a win of the hole ... lookout, lookout, lookout ... oh, he swirled it in there! 'What a partner I found,' he says; 'what a partner!'

JAY HAAS: He just seems to be in control at all times. He's never flustered.

ANNC: 6&5 margin by Furyk and Haas! 8-under in their 13 holes of better ball!

STEWART CINK: It was always amazing how the adrenalin would be like just coursing through our bodies and Furyk's like the same exact guy, like, just same exact distance pin high.

ANNC: That's startin' right at it ... that's all over it!

STEWART CINK: He had like the ice water veins. He's so competitive, he just wanted to win.

VICTORY AND FURYK WERE SYNONOMOUS ... AS HE DID SO 17 TIMES ON THE PGA TOUR ... NOTABLY THE 2003 U.S. OPEN, THE 2010 TOUR CHAMPIONSHIP, AND BACK-TO-BACK TITLES IN THE RBC CANADIAN OPEN ...

JIM FURYK: Canadian fans have always treated me very well, very friendly. And so, I've always enjoyed traveling here.

MIKE WEIR: Always had great respect for Jim. He's done extremely well on the PGA TOUR and he's a great guy.

FURYK'S PERSONAL SUCCESS AND EXPERIENCE IN TEAM COMPETITIONS EARNED HIM A RYDER CUP CAPTAINCY FOR THE UNITED STATES IN 2018, AND A ROLE AS CAPTAIN'S ASSISTANT IN BOTH THE 2015 AND 2017 PRESIDENTS CUPS ...

JAY HAAS: Jim checks his ego at the door and does what's needed, and I think that will be his strongest suit leading this team.

DAVID TOMS: He's just kind of a calming presence in the room. And he always seems to have a good game plan.

CHRIS DIMARCO: No matter how enormous the situation is, he's not going to get caught up in everything and just be able to steady the ship when things are going awry or when things are going good to have that balance to be able to bring it back to normal. And I think that's what you're looking for in captain.

JIM FURYK: This younger generation's seen me around the Ryder Cups and Presidents Cups as an assistant captain kind of understand who I am and how much these events mean to me. I want to lead by example and I want 12 guys that really, really enjoy being the away team and on the road. And we'll take pride in that and come in here and play hard.

A4 – U.S. TEAM STANDINGS

LET'S TAKE A LOOK AT THE CURRENT UNITED STATES STANDINGS ... THE TOP SIX FOLLOWING THE BMW CHAMPIONSHIP WILL AUTOMATICALLY QUALIFY FOR THE U.S. TEAM ... AND THE 2022 PRESIDENTS CUP ROOKIE AND CURRENT WORLD NUMBER ONE, SCOTTIE SCHEFFLER, LEADS THE WAY FOR THE AMERICANS.

TO FILL OUT THE REMAINDING SIX SPOTS ON HIS TEAM, CAPTAIN FURYK WILL SELECT SIX PLAYERS OF HIS CHOOSING FOLLOWING THE TOUR CHAMPIONSHIP.

WITH A TALENTED GROUP OF PLAYERS IN THE POOL, CAPTAIN FURYK WILL NEED TO BE STRATEGIC IN MAKING THE RIGHT PICKS ... JUST AS STRATEGY WILL BE CRITICAL ONCE COMPEITION BEGINS, NOTABLY ON ONE OF ROYAL MONTREAL'S KEY HOLES ON THE BACK NINE.

A5 – JIM FURYK 14th HOLE WALK & TALK

ANNC: We'll move ahead to 14 and what a wonderful, short par four. Just 280 yards in length today.

JIM FURYK: We're presently standing on a new tee box that was recently built. Kind of, trees cleared. It's uh, a beautiful look. It's about 400 yards from this tee box. You're gonna see a lot of guys maybe hit it out there 250 yards, leave themselves a 150 shot.

ANNC: I'll tell you one thing about Jim Furyk. You're not going to wear him out. He'll wear you out before you wear him out.

JIM FURYK: 14, we're walking up. This tee was built for the 2007 Presidents Cup. The tee marker here in the middle of the tee says 301 yards to the middle of the green. So, we're probably looking at approximately 285 to the front. This is gonna give a lot of guys an opportunity to want to drive the green.

ANNC: Oh, he just ripped this one ... they've been waiting all day to see that!

JIM FURYK: If I were to guess, you know, playing in a lot of Presidents Cups, I would say they would try to make this hole a drivable par four in the four-ball matchups where you have two partners. One guy can play conservative, one guy could be aggressive.

JIM FURYK: This is kind of where I remember hitting it off the tee in 2007. Playing a wedge to nine iron into the green.

ANNC: Oh you look for this one to be close. Furyk is good with the wedges from this distance ... that's a good angle to putt from though, isn't it? Yeah. A little right-to-lefter. Yeah, uphill, a little right-to-left.

JIM FURYK: The other thing about this hole that's very interesting is really the severety of the green. It's a little bit of a boomerang shape. As you can see, very narrow, small green. It's when the rules officials put the pin somewhere in this area, this is the primetime to maybe pull out a driver, try to put it just short of the green on the front fringe.

JIM FURYK: So number 14 here at Royal Montreal, it could be a pivotal hole. A turning point in any match. It's a short hole. Have to get the ball in play. Maybe drivable. Can be setup a number of different ways, but late in the round, you don't want to lose any holes.

B1 – CAPTAINS VISIT – OLD MONTREAL

MIKE WEIR NATS: Look at this place with all their flowers in every window up here.

JIM FURYK NATS: Here we are in old town. I mean, this feels like old world, somewhere in Europe. Beautiful streets and this would be a great place to take a stroll.

JIM FURYK: A lot to do here, lot of great sites and history here. Hopefully the players will have an opportunity to see some of that.

MIKE WEIR: As a youth, I came here a couple of times, we did some ski trips. Just like the rest of Canada, we're very multi-dimensional, multiracial around this country. This city has a lot of great culture, a lot of great architecture, a lot of great food. So, I think that's why people love coming here.

JIM FURYK NATS: Frommage!

MIKE WEIR NATS: Exactly. You got it. You got it. Jimmy, nice!

JIM FURYK: Winning their national championship two years in a row, they've always treated me very well, very friendly. I've always enjoyed traveling here. I feel like a little bit of a second son here.

MIKE WEIR: It starts to hit home a little bit that it's not too far around the corner. Very excited about the opportunity to host the world.

B2 – THE ROYAL MONTREAL GOLF CLUB

FROM OLD MONTREAL ... TO THE OLDEST GOLF COURSE IN NORTH AMERICA ... THE PRESIDENTS CUP RETURNS TO THE ROYAL MONTREAL GOLF CLUB FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE 2007 ...

MIKE WEIR: It's a worthy venue. It's a great course.

JIM FURYK: It's withstood the test of time. It's a wonderful golf course.

STEWART CINK: Any sporting event held in an old city like Montreal is just going to be better because of the history and the generations of things that have occurred there.

SCOTT DICKSON: The pride is very, very high because they know that Royal Montreal is on the world class scale. On our course record board, we have Jack Nicklaus' name, we have Tom Weiskopf's name. So, we've had phenomenal rounds of golf played. And we've been so proud to host some of the world's greatest players of all time.

MIKE WEIR: The golf course is very traditional golf course.

JIM FURYK: It's a good course for match play. I think it gives you a lot of options off the tee.

WOODY AUSTIN: The uniqueness of that golf course is the slopes of the fairways are opposite. So, if the hole dog legs right, fairway slopes left. And so, it's difficult to keep the ball in the fairway.

RETIEF GOOSEN: It's a great golf course. It's a lot of risk reward shots; a lot of water around.

ANNC: And is this one headed for the water? Yes!

STEWART CINK: There's a lot of water in play about midway through the back nine. Back-to-back par fours where you have to hit it out of some peninsulas and across the water to the greens.

ANNC: And that ... went in the hazard.

STEWART CINK: That part of the course is awesome for match play because there's a lot of cool shots coming down the stretch there where you have to decide how much you're going to take on.

ANNC: He splashed it left in that water. Ugh, what a mistake!

STUART APPLEBY: I expect some length I expect a different golf course, but I think the DNA of it will be very similar to '07. Crowds will be huge. Canadians love their sport.

JIM FURYK: It'll test all aspects of the player's game. And so, I think it's a great venue.

B3 – FIRST TEE ATMOSPHERE

ONE OF THE SIGNATURE ELEMENTS OF THE PRESIDENTS CUP IS THE ATMOSPHERE ON THE FIRST TEE ...

AND WHILE THE PHYSCIAL STRUCTURE HAS GROWN THROUGH THE YEARS, THE WEIGHT OF THE MOMENT HAS ALWAYS BEEN IMMEASURABLE.

MIKE WEIR: There's a lot going on on the first tee of a Presidents Cup compared to a regular event ... it's an electric atmosphere.

NATS: U-S-A! U-S-A!

RETIEFF GOOSEN: The crowd goes mad.

MIKE WEIR: Those fans that were there and remember 2022, the enclosed atmosphere...

NATS: Woah! Yeah!

MIKE WEIR: Stadium-like feel that the players felt there. The chants from the crowd.

ANNC: Tom Kim cranks them up. This is how he likes it.

STEWART CINK: The first tees got progressively bigger and the first shots off the first tee became progressively more difficult.

WOODY AUSTIN: I can't describe it just shaking in your boots.

CHRIS DIMARCO: Anybody who says that they're not nervous is lying. We prepare ourselves for those types of things but there is no pressure like a Presidents Cup.

THIS YEAR'S STADIUM WILL SEAT ROUGHLY 2,500 FANS, MIMICKING THE BUILDOUT FROM 2022, WHICH WAS THE LARGEST IN PRESIDENTS CUP HISTORY.

MIKE WEIR: There's going to be that similar atmosphere, but it's all going to be wrapped in our home team black.

JIM FURYK: We'll throw a few American fans in here for sure but yeah were going to be outnumbered. Every player has a great anticipation for the first tee right, they come from the putting green, to enter in a stadium like atmosphere, fans cheering ... there's going to be a lot of Canadian fans and a lot of international fans here cheering for their team and it just creates a lot of excitement.

MIKE WEIR: To hit that opening tee shot, you've got to control your adrenaline or use it to your advantage. It's always great to be on the first tee.

JIM FURYK: There's no place you'd rather be.

C1 – REJOIN

THIS IS THE ROAD TO THE PRESIDENTS CUP – BROUGHT TO YOU BY GLOBAL PARTNERS ROLEX ... ONE PASSWORD... AND COGNIZANT.

<u>C2 – INTERNATIONAL TEAM DINNERS</u>

IN AN ONGOING EFFORT TO BUILD TEAM CAMARADERIE, CAPTAIN WEIR HAS GATHERED INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS THROUGHOUT THE YEAR FOR TEAM DINNERS.

MIKE WEIR: The shield and this logo has brought guys together much more. You see it out on the PGA TOUR, the guys playing practice rounds a lot more together, guys being a lot more friendly, going to dinners with one another.

ERIK van ROOYEN: Those dinners are so great. We come together, we hangout, we talk about the history of the Presidents Cup, how badly we all want to win it, and that lights a fire.

MIKE WEIR NATS: I really appreciate you guys coming here. Just, there's nothing too formal about this evening. It's about us guys getting together, getting to know one another, familiarizing ourselves.

RYAN FOX: Mike's doing a great job. I felt probably a little lonely this year at times out here and it's actually made it easier to go, 'ok, well let's organize a practice round with, with a couple of guys from the team.'

ERIK van ROOYEN: The more and more that continues, the stronger this teams gonna get.

<u>C3 – INTERNATIONAL TEAM STANDINGS</u>

LET'S TAKE A LOOK AT HOW THE TABLE IS CURRENTLY SET FOR THE INTERNATIONAL TEAM. THE TOP SIX WILL AUTOMATICALLY QUALIFY FOLLOWING THE BMW CHAMPIONSHIP AND ONE OF THE BLACK AND GOLD'S MOST SEASONED VETERANS, HIDEKI MATSUYAMA, LEADS THE STANDINGS.

TO COMPLETE HIS TEAM, CAPTAIN WEIR WILL MAKE SIX SELECTIONS FROM THE REMAINING POOL – WHICH FEATURES PLAYERS WITH PRESIDENTS CUP EXPERIENCE, POTENTIAL FIRST TIMERS, AND FELLOW COUNTRYMEN.

WEIR'S PRESIDENTS CUP WISDOM WILL HELP GUIDE HIM AS HE LOOKS FOR PLAYERS WHO WILL EMBODY *HIS* NEVER-BACK-DOWN SPIRIT THAT HE BROUGHT TO EIGHT INTERNATIONAL TEAMS.

C4 – MIKE WEIR PRESIDENTS CUP CAREER

MIKE WEIR: My goal is to find out what's inside these guys. Sometimes passion and smarts and some other intangibles can override maybe some deficiencies you might have.

WHO BETTER THAN CAPTAIN MIKE WEIR TO ACCEPT THAT CHALLENGE ... NEVER THE BIGGEST IN STATURE, BUT ALWAYS FOUND A WAY TO PERSERVERE ...

MIKE WEIR: Growing up being a smaller guy and always hearing that, you're too small, you don't hit far enough.

MIKE WEIR: I grew up playing team sports – hockey, baseball, volleyball, basketball. When the opportunity came for me in my first Presidents Cup in 2000, how excited I was to be on a team again.

ANNC: Mike Weir will have a chance to close it out against Lehman and Roberts ...

TOM LEHMAN: He proved a lot in a hurry. The first time I played with him, I remember saying to my caddie, 'this guy is going to be a world beater.'

ANNC: Point number three!

TOM LEHMAN: A tenacious, tough competitor who just never seems to kind of back away from the moment.

ANNC: Mike Weir with a chance to win the hole ... there you go!

STUART APPLEBY: Great teammate. Someone you could talk to. Someone's going to give you an honest opinion. Easy to get along with. Tough competitor.

ANNC: How pure was that!? ... He's got Tiger one down. And he's staying calm; that's very important.

RETIEF GOOSEN: Mike is a very steady, mentally strong person. He's always been a super guy to be around. Definitely has the right temperament and mentality to be a great captain.

MIKE WEIR: I'm proud of my play and I feel like I brought a certain amount of grit and determination to our team. So that's what I'm trying to instill in our guys.

WEIR PLAYED IN FIVE PRESIDENTS CUPS – ONLY SITTING OUT ONE SESSION – AND EARNED 14 POINTS FOR THE INTERNATIONAL TEAM WITH A 13-9-2 RECORD ...

MIKE WEIR: If I think back to my own career, the Presidents Cup memories are right at the top of the list compared to my own individual achievements.

PUTTING TEAM AHEAD OF SELF EMBODIES THE MAN THAT MIKE IS ... IN ADDITION TO EIGHT PGA TOUR VICTORIES, INCLUDING CANADA'S ONLY MEN'S MAJOR CHAMPIONSHIP – THE 2003 MASTERS ...

ERNIE ELS: The best player to ever have come out of Canada. He's been such an influential member of our team throughout all the years as a player and as assistant captain. He knows what we need to do.

JIM FURYK: He's seen what's worked, what hasn't. He's learned from Trevor, from Ernie. Wrapping that all up with being here in Montreal and being in Canada, I mean, Mike is obviously a clear-cut choice.

ERNIE ELS: Having an icon of Canadian sport like Mike, being the captain in Canada, it's going to be huge. It's going to be epic.

MIKE WEIR: It starts to hit home a little bit that it's not too far around the corner. Very excited about the opportunity. Yeah, very excited about it.

C5 – 18TH HOLE STANDUP

THIS SPECIFIC PATCH OF HOME SOIL IS ESPECIALLY MEANINGFUL TO MIKE WEIR. IT WAS A GREAT SUNDAY FOR ALL OF CANADA, THAT CULMINATED RIGHT HERE, ON THE 18TH GREEN, DURING THE 2007 PRESIDENTS CUP.

C6 – MIKE WEIR 18TH HOLE WALK & TALK

ANNC: Mike's played two beautiful holes in a row. If he can get this in the fairway, I think it's advantage Weir, I really do.

MIKE WEIR: What's great about this hole when that when the matches do come down to this hole it's, it's a pretty intimidating tee shot.

ANNC: He's looking left is it okay? It's going right on the ledge of the water, but I think it's going to be all right. Yeah, that's good. That's a great tee shot.

MIKE WEIR: There's water down the left. You have to fit it between the bunkers out there on the right. And it's very important to hit the fairway here. It's probably one of the most, narrow tee shots if you're deciding to hit driver.

ANNC: It's 466-yard par four and he got a big drive there though, Roger, he got that hop off of that little hill.

MIKE WEIR: You can see here as we get into the meat of where guys mostly will be hitting it from this 200-yards-and-in spot, the fairway starts to pinch hit a little bit.

ANNC: Just 170 left to the hole Johnny.

ANNC: He's walking – good looking shot – he's walking after.

MIKE WEIR: I remember when I did hit my second shot from here, Gary Player coming over and giving me a big hug, I think he was, he was pretty happy.

ANNC: This little guy from Canada has stood out in a big way. He's going to end up the best point getter for the internationals.

MIKE WEIR: The crowd was incredible. They really pulled me through that match. I was glad to give them something to cheer about that day.

MIKE WEIR: I remember Tiger being in this pretty deep rough here. And people are starting to say, 'congrats, Mike.' And I said to Brian my caddie, 'he's going to hole this.' You know I just, that's, that's what he does, you know, in these kind of moments. Sure enough, you chip this ball up and it looked like it was going in and just missed the edge. And he came over and shook my hand.

MIKE WEIR: And a huge day for Mike Weir and Canada!

MIKE WEIR: I think it's a great finishing hole. There will be a lot of people up here. If there is a match that comes 18, it'll be super exciting.

<u>D1 – CAPTAINS VISIT – MONTREAL CANADIENS</u>

MIKE WEIR NATS: The old announcers would say "la première étoile". The first star from the Montreal Canadiens. Number 12. Yvan Cournoyer. Go Habs, go!

MIKE WEIR NATS: Growing up in Canada, this is one of the iconic teams. So, to be up here in Montreal, get to learn a little bit about more of the history of the team here today and it's been great.

THE MONTREAL CANADIENS ARE ONE OF THE MOST HISTORIC FRANCHISES IN SPORT. AND BOTH PRESIDENT CUP CAPTAINS LOOK TO ABSORB AS MUCH KNOWLEDGE AS THEY CAN IN HOPES TO CONFIGURE THEIR OWN WINNING CULTURE.

TOUR GUIDE NATS: This is our Stanley Cup wall. 24.

MIKE WEIR NATS: Yeah.

JIM FURYK NATS: The late 60s and 70s that was all Yvan. But goodness gracious.

TOUR GUIDE NATS: Is this kind of like fun for you, that having with the team thing where you guys get to like, bond as a unit?

MIKE WEIR NATS: Yeah.

JIM FURYK NATS: Absolutely.

MIKE WEIR NATS: Yeah.

MIKE WEIR NATS: It's awesome to get everybody together. Yeah.

JIM FURYK: We enjoy that team atmosphere, we enjoy the camaraderie of it all. Whether it's the international team and their seal or the flag on our sleeve representing our country, we don't get the opportunity to do that very often in our sport.

JIM FURYK NATS: Kind of like, diggin' this guy right here, right now.

TOUR GUIDE NATS: You like Savard, eh?

JIM FURYK NATS: I like the number 58.

MIKE WEIR: They have a huge fan base. They love their Montreal Canadiens. And we hope we get them supporting the internationals out here.

D2 – CLOSING STANDUP

THE 24-TIME STANLEY CUP CHAMPIONS HAVE ESTABLISHED WINNING ROOTS IN QUEBEC, MAKING IT A FITTING LOCATION TO BATTLE FOR ONE OF *GOLF'S* MOST NOTABLE CUPS.

THANKS FOR JOINING US THIS AFTERNOON – I'M PAIGE MACKENZIE – AND WE'LL SEE YOU NEXT WEEK, WHEN WE'LL EXPLORE WHICH PLAYERS CAPTAIN FURYK AND CAPTAIN WEIR MIGHT SELECT TO COMPLETE THEIR TEAMS - AS WE CONTINUE DOWN THE ROAD TO THE PRESIDENTS CUP.

<u>D3 – ROLLOUT</u>

COLLIN MORIKAWA: Any time you're able to represent your country or represent the United States, you just want to perform, you want to be at your absolute best and you want to come out and win.

NATS: Go! Go! Go!

ANNC: Oh Yes!

SAM BURNS: As a kid growing up, I always dreamed of playing, you know, team events for, you know, my country.

ANNC: Sam Burns with a monster eagle!

ADAM SCOTT: We're seeing the old guard of the internationals moved out and the new generation of players coming in, which is very exciting and the enthusiasm is at an all-time high.

SCOTTIE SCHEFFLER: I would say they're definitely hungry. They've got a lot of young talent.

ANNC: These guys can play like brothers too and in case you didn't notice, it's starting to get contagious.
